2024 EVENT OVERVIEW

Get set for the world's greatest male and female riders to descend on Geelong and the Surf Coast region kicking off the first one day classics on the Women's WorldTour and UCI WorldTour calendars.

The action-packed five-day cycling festival kicks off on Wednesday January 24 with the Geelong Classic women's criterium, followed by the UCI Sanctioned 1.1 Classification Surf Coast Classic men's race, which will take place on Thursday January 25 - two newly introduced mid-week races for the 2024 event.

Friday 26 January will see the GeelongPort Family Ride along the Geelong Waterfront. While hundreds of recreational riders are set to find their own greatness on the bike during the 2024 TAC People's Ride on Saturday 27 January. With two ride options available – The Cadel Classic (113km) and Cadel's Hometown (59km) there is a distance for all! The long course will once again encompass the very popular and challenging Challambra Crescent climb.

Now the first one day classic on the UCI Women's WorldTour, crowds will then experience some of the world's best female cyclists take to the course for the Deakin University Elite Women's Race on Saturday 27 January.

And, finally, on Sunday 28 January, 13 UCI WorldTour Teams will line-up for the 2024 Elite Men's race, the Cadel Evans Great Ocean Road Race.



CADEL EVANS GREAT OCEAN ROAD RACE

The Cadel Evans Great Ocean Road Race welcomes the world's best riders and teams to Geelong and the Surf Coast over the weekend of January 26-28th, 2024.

Cycling fans and enthusiasts get the chance to be up close and personal as they watch some of Australia's and the world's best battle it out culminating in the feature UCI WorldTour Deakin University Elite Women's and UCI WorldTour Elite Men's races which weave their way through the scenic roads of the Geelong, Bellarine and Surf Coast regions. Inspired by Europe's prestigious one-day classics, the Cadel Evans Great Ocean Road Race is the first of its kind in Australia and has been rapidly embraced at a local and international level becoming a pillar of Australia's major events calendar.

A true celebration of cycling, the event has consistently attracted close to 120,000 spectators each year, and showcases regional Victoria to over 100 countries worldwide through international broadcast.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS

ELITE WOMEN

Adegeest edged out Australia's Amanda Spratt (Trek-Segafredo) in a thrilling two-rider sprint to collect her first WorldTour win and the seventh edition of the women's elite race.

Riding for her FDJ-Suez teammate Grace Brown, Adegeest took control of the race as her teammate faded.

The deciding attack didn't come until the final of two Challambra climbs on the 140.8 km circuit when the pair broke away. Spratt didn't have the legs to contest for the win and Adegeest capitalised, sprinting away to edge out her opponent in the last 200m to take the victory. Her impressive performance on the Challambra ascents also netted her the Visit Victoria Queen of the Mountain jersey. Georgia Howe (Team Jayco AlUla) was the pick of the sprinters while Josie Nelson (Team Coop-Hitech Products) won the Gerry Ryan Award Young Rider Classification.

ELITE MEN

Emotions ran high after Marius Mayrhofer claimed his maiden WorldTour win in the 2023 men's elite race. After 176 km in wet and gusty conditions, it was Mayrhofer who prevailed in a hectic bunch sprint marred by a threerider spill just 200 metres from the line. The 22-year-old, from Team DSM, managed to dodge any friendly fire and outlasted Hugo Page (Intermarché Circus Wanty) and Australia's Simon Clarke (Israel-Premier Tech) at the finish. Page's runner-up finish topped off an impressive effort from Intermarché Circus Wanty, with Taco van der Hoorn making his solo early break stick until the last 40 kilometres of the race. The Dutch cyclist braved the unfavourable Surf Coast conditions alone throughout the afternoon and was rewarded with both the Mapei Sprint and Visit Victoria King of the Mountain jerseys.

UCI DEAKIN UNIVERSITY ELITE WOMEN'S RACE

The Deakin University Elite Women's Race was awarded UCI Women's WorldTour status in 2020 - The highest tier of racing. As one of the early races on the 2024 Women's WorldTour calendar, many of the world's best riders will be out to seek glory on the roads of Geelong and the Surf Coast. Three of the four leading teams on the UCI women's pro tour are headed to the Cadel Road Race to tackle the 2024 UCI Women's WorldTour certified course featuring 143km of unpredictable action as riders negotiate scenic roads, rolling hills, technical corners and pinchy climbs in this modern one day classic.

WATCH OUT FOR:

- The Liv AlUla Jayco race strategy after a strong start to the year, Ruby Roseman-Gannon is in form and can win from both a sprint or a breakaway
- Featuring a record nine UCI WorldTour teams, the high quality field should put on a show at Challambra with aggressive racing featuring multiple attacks and counter attacks
- With strong team depth, previous winner Amanda Spratt is looking to stake her claim and become the first rider to win the Deakin University Elite Women's Road Race twice
- » Early breakaways from local team ARA Skip Capital and Bridgelane

CADEL EVANS GREAT OCEAN ROAD RACE

In 2024 we welcome back the world's best to tackle 176km of scenic roads, rolling hills, technical corners and pinchy climbs across the Cadel Evans Great Ocean Road Race. Race Director Scott Sunderland changed the direction of the course for 2023 so the riders and teams will need to be on top of their race strategy to best work out how to set their riders up for the ultimate success, with this course route set to continue for the second year running in 2024. Riders will again take on Challambra four times, 14 years after the climb featured in the UCI Road World Championships held in Geelong back in 2010. The race will see a strong contingent of Australian favourites including Caleb Ewan and newly crowned Australian National Champion Lucas Plapp who will be challenged by the likes of 2019 winner Elia Viviani and Inos Grenadiers teammate, Filippo Ganna as well as the sprinters such as Milan Fretin from Cofidis. Fans can be assured of tight, tough racing for the entire day.

- » Early breakaways for riders wanting to win the sprint and climbing classification
- The tug of war between attacking riders and teams wanting to control the race between the last climb up Challambra and the finish line
- Ineos Grenadiers, which has not only a returning winner in Elia Viviani but also very strong group of supporting riders including Olympic champion and multiple world record holder super star Filippo Ganna
- Team Jayco AlUla with the dual options of Caleb Ewan to win from a group sprint or Lucas Plapp from a late breakaway

ONE ICONIC LOCATION

CADEL'S BACKYARD CAPTURES EVERYTHING THAT IS UNIQUE AND IDENTIFIABLY AUSTRALIAN

Starting and finishing on the magnificent Geelong waterfront, the race could not be showcased in a more picturesque location, made famous as images of the 2010 UCI Road World Championship were beamed around the world in October of that year with Cadel Evans attempting to defend his 2009 world championship title.

As the race departs Geelong, it remains in neutral for approximately 3 kilometres. Once the flag drops, the peloton initially race south and a few riders with itchy feet will look to establish an early break.

BARRABOOL ROAD TO MORIAC AND CERES -AUSTRALIAN BUSH LAND

Once the race leaves Geelong it winds through the picturesque townships of Moriac and Ceres, television audiences will get a taste of Australian bush land. Look carefully and viewers may see a koala or kangaroo. The riders will get some respite in this section protected by eucalyptus trees – in winter this section is known for its rolling green hills, while in summer the parched Australian landscape provides its own unique beauty.

BELLS BEACH - SUPERB COASTLINE

The race then winds its way toward the iconic Bells Beach, home of the World Surf League Rip Curl Pro. The rolling hills toward the coast are the first real test for the riders, and teams will begin to get a sense of how they are positioned within the race and King of the Mountain prize. Along the Bells Beach coastline, there is a chance for the riders to take in the stunning scenery of the coast and beaches overlooked by cliff tops – this is where the race begins to heat up.

TORQUAY - THE START OF THE GREAT OCEAN ROAD

Leaving Bells Beach and heading to Torquay the riders will look to one another to see who wants to do the work on the front. Torquay is the official start of the Great Ocean Road, Australia's surfing mecca and an important part of the Cadel Evans Great Ocean Road Race. The many families, swimmers and surfers who gather at the busy beaches in Torquay will pause as the colourful peloton passes by. The Esplanade will be lined with spectators cheering on their favourite teams.

BARWON HEADS - HOMETOWN GLORY

A long stretch from Torquay past Breamlea and Thirteenth Beach where surfers and beachgoers will watch in awe as the peloton passes by this 4.5 kilometre stretch of beach at pace. The potential strong offshore winds will test the peloton here and will see the riders exposed to the elements as they head towards the hamlet of Barwon Heads. The home of Cadel Evans when he is in Australia, located at the mouth of the Barwon River, Barwon Heads is known for its quiet river beaches, friendly cafes and fishing opportunities galore. Expect large crowds lining the main street and at key viewing locations as this sleepy hamlet comes alive to support their cycling heroes.

OCEAN GROVE TO LEOPOLD TO GEELONG

Another long stretch as the riders pass through the lush and fertile areas of the Bellarine Peninsula, home to an impressive collection of wineries, farm gates, provedores and fresh local produce. The riders will have little time to enjoy the beautiful natural surroundings as they plan their return to Geelong and the gruelling circuit still to come.



GEELONG - THE CHALLENGING 2010 ROAD WORLDS CIRCUIT

As the race re-enters Geelong it signals the arrival onto the finishing circuits, with a grueling 66.7 kilometres still to travel—the teams will be seriously thinking about their strategy toward the finale.

The fastest point in the race is the descent down Scenic Road, touching speeds of nearly 85 kilometres per hour to Queens Park where the race crosses the Barwon River via the heritage listed Queens Bridge. Queens Park is another uniquely Australian location with the silt filled river touched by bending eucalyptus trees, ideal for swimming, fishing or just dangling your legs from the river bank on a hot summer's day.

Teams should not underestimate the two pinch climbs, as the course makes its way out of Queens Park and heads toward the Geelong waterfront where the teams will get their first glance at what the finale will look like in three laps time.

The Challambra Climb, should not be underestimated, particularly as the elite teams take on this challenging urban climb four times. Local residents and cycling fans will be lining the street as they get to see the world's best pass by their front door and memories of the hugely successful 2010 UCI Road Worlds will return.

Expect the circuits to get faster and faster with the average speed for lap one approximately 42 kilometres an hour, reaching a possible 50 kilometres per hour by the last.

SPRINT TO THE LINE

The finish is a fast one, provided the sprinters are still intact. Look for a bunch sprint finish that will test the teams to the end, while thousands of spectators will line the Geelong waterfront in what is a truly magnificent spectacle and a fitting place to crown the 2024 Cadel Evans Great Ocean Road Race champion.

BREATHE EASY IN GEELONG AND THE BELLARINE

Geelong and The Bellarine will captivate you. From exceptional food and wine, world-class golf courses, shopping and village atmosphere to striking bay and ocean views, this distinctive sense of serenity found in the region is only one hour's drive from Melbourne.

TORQUAY – YOUR GATEWAY TO THE GREAT OCEAN ROAD

Torquay is the official start of the Great Ocean Road and Australia's surf mecca. The 243 kilometre Great Ocean Road features rocky cliff faces and steep coastal mountains, a route that today is considered one of the world's most scenic coastal drives.



Meaning of Geelong and Corio Bay

Before white settlement, the Wathaurong People occupied vast lands including the Bellarine Peninsula and swathes to the north west of Geelong. They called the bay "Jillong" and the surrounding land "Corayo". The name Jillong has a meaning similar to "a place of the sea bird over the white cliffs" but the early settlers somehow transposed the terms and now the land is known as Geelong and the bay is Corio.

The Geelong Keys

A set of five iron keys that were discovered in 1845 (in a pit at Limeburners Point) became famous because Governor La Trobe became personally fascinated in their origin. In his opinion, they were "at least 150-200 years old". Interest in the keys remained high for years, and the keys were the subject of two pamphlets published by the Royal Society of Victoria in the 1870s. The keys themselves, and all original drawings of them, have been lost. The limeburner who found the keys showed them to La Trobe when he visited the workings the very next day, however by then one had been lost by the limeburner's children, another had been given away as a curiosity. It is believed they were of Portuguese origin -, meaning there may have been evidence of visitors to our shores well before Cook discovered Australia in 1770.

Geelong's Bollard Trail

The Bollard Trail extends along the waterfront, from Limeburners Point to Rippleside Park. This walk features 48 sites with over 100 bollards - estimated walking time is 2 hours one way. It all started in 1995 when artist Jan Mitchell was commissioned by the City of Greater Geelong to transform reclaimed timber pier pylons into these remarkable works of art. The bollards now reflect some of the unique characters who played a part in Geelong's history, from the original Indigenous inhabitants to more contemporary characters.

Lime Kilns industrial site.

Evidence of early industrial activity is just around from Eastern Beach, on the southern shore of Corio Bay. The lime kiln complex at Lime Burners Point consists of the visible ruined remains of three (of the original five) brick lime kilns built deep into the cliffs. The industry existed from 1836 to 1884 for the production of lime for mortar, and the remaining kilns date from the 1860s and 1870s. Lime burning ceased on the site in the 1880s when better deposits were found.

The **Geelong Waterfront** is home to a lively annual calendar of events, green open spaces, striking public art and loads of places to eat and drink. The Waterfront precinct is Geelong's favourite place to play.

KILOMETRE: 0.1-2.0 (NEUTRAL ZONE) Yarra Street

Central Geelong - Central Geelong - Sometimes the best places aren't obvious. Central Geelong is evolving with the development of laneways and precincts to eat, drink, explore, shop and enjoy. Little Malop Street is the centre of the cultural precinct with the Arts Centre and the incredible dome-shaped Geelong Library and Heritage Centre. Just a little further along you'll find a bustling live music scene, several bars and restaurants with al fresco options. There's incredible street art down several alleys and a unique blend of shops and galleries. The newly opened Geelong Arts Centre is also now Australia's largest dedicated regional performing arts centre. A striking new landmark with unique architecture for the city.

Yarra Street

Cross Brougham Street

Customs House in Brougham Street is a bluestone and freestone classical style public building, constructed in 1855, at the peak of the gold rush. The building has two distinctive principal elevations: the single storey elevation to Brougham Street and the three storeyed facade facing Corio Bay. It was restored in 2012, winning a National Trust Award, and now the upper floors are offices while the original (lower rear) bond store, opening onto a public space and the bay, is a restaurant – The Greek @ Customs House.

Yarra Street

Cross Malop Street

The Geelong Library and Heritage Centre - The striking Geelong Library & Heritage Centre, known locally as 'the Dome' is an award winning magnificent building gracing Geelong's skyline. Inside, this impressive and digitally-advanced space is the perfect platform for innovative and world-leading library and information services. Set in the heart of Geelong's Cultural precinct, this iconic architecture houses a future-ready sphere of reading, learning and fun that will change the way you think about libraries. Designed to be an inspiring, multipurpose space, the centre will be many things to many different people. Each level is unique with gathering places, reading spaces, the latest technology, spectacular collections, children's and youth hubs, function zones, café and more. Under the domed roof of this classically-inspired space, the past and future coexist effortlessly. It is also the home of the Geelong region's vast collection of heritage archives.

Yarra Street

Cross Ryrie Street

Ned Kelly visited Geelong - A favourite local legend is the visit to Geelong in 1870 by Australia's best- known bushranger, Ned Kelly. He was just 13 at the time and was employed by gentleman bushranger Harry Power, who had previously owned a horse yard in Geelong. Power, at age 50, had escaped from Pentridge Prison in 1869, and became a bushranger. Kelly's role as Power's apprentice was to care for their horses as they travelled, and indeed Kelly was later arrested as a teenager for associating with Power. The pub where they stayed was demolished in 1915. The ornate building at 96 Ryrie Street, occupied by Lombards now stands on that site.

T&G Building (Moorabool and Ryrie Streets)

- One of the most notable buildings on Geelong's skyline is the beautiful Art Deco and heritage listed T&G building. This iconic building has stood on the corner of Moorabool and Ryrie Streets for nearly 90 years. Designed by A&K Henderson, the building was built for the Temperance and General Mutual Life Assurance Society or the T&G. The T&G built many buildings in a similar art deco style around Australia and even New Zealand. The beautiful and distinctive white rendered facade and clock tower of the T&G can be found in Mildura, Horsham, Melbourne, Townsville and Hobart, but Geelong's is by far the most impressive. In 1934, the famous Father and Son clock, built by renowned clock makers Harrison Bradfield and Ingram's, was installed. This clock extends out from the tower on the hour when the Father and Son figures bang their enormous bell. These two figures have become such an identity around Geelong they are often dressed in Geelong Football Jumpers during the football finals; they even get a Christmas make over some years with a red hat and coat.

Geelong Gallery - Established in 1896, the Geelong Gallery is one of Australia's leading and oldest regional art galleries.

Since its establishment, the gallery has amassed a magnificent collection of 19th to 21st century Australian and European paintings and decorative arts, including 18th and 19th century English porcelain, British art pottery, colonial Australian silver, as well as contemporary Australian paintings, prints, sculpture and ceramics.

Geelong Gallery works to contribute to the life and well-being of the city by fostering strong community engagement with the excellence of its collection, its creative lifelong learning experiences, and inspiring exhibitions.

KILOMETRE: 2-3.3 (RACE START AT 2.2KM) Moorabool Street

Moorabool Street to Barrabool Road

GMHBA Stadium and Kardinia Park - GMHBA Stadium is a sporting and entertainment venue located within Kardinia Park in South Geelong. The stadium, which is managed by the Kardinia Park Stadium Trust, is the home ground of the Geelong Football Club. The light towers and grandstands of GMHBA Stadium dominate the view. Home of the Geelong Cats AFL team, the stadium will hold 42,000 spectators – usually they're Cat fans but the venue also hosts cricket, soccer and other large events.

Geelong is the home of the **Geelong Cats Football Club**, which was formed in 1859, making The Cats the second oldest club in the Australian Football League (AFL).

The Brownlow Medal - Awarded to the "best and fairest" player during the AFL's home-and-away season, the Brownlow Medal, football's most prestigious award, is named after Geelong player and administrator Charles "Chas" Brownlow.

Carji Greeves Medal - Geelong footballer Edward "Carji" Greeves, winner of the inaugural Brownlow

Medal in 1924, and namesake of the Carji Greeves Medal, awarded to Geelong's best and fairest player of the season.

Origin of the term "Pivitovians" - The term

"Pivotovians" was widely used during the 19th century to refer to local Geelong residents. Geelong was often referred to as the 'pivot' based on its location as a port and entry to the Goldfields in the early days. In fact, Australian Football League team, The Geelong Cats up to 1922 was known as "The Pivotovians". Today the name continues in a number of businesses, in particular Pivot Fertilizers, the Pivotovian Cinema, Pivot Stoves and Heating, and of course the international Pivot Summit event. And of course, whenever local residents happen to meet in distant locations, they address each other in code, typically saying "Ah another Pivitovian, I presume?"

Charles Brownlow - 14 Sydney Avenue, Geelong is a regular family home built in the 1880s for Charles Brownlow, a local watchmaker and the current owners proudly display its heritage on a plaque just inside their front fence. After a stellar playing career (his first year as a player was 1879, was captain in 1884 and coach from 1892 to 1917) Brownlow was also the Secretary of the Pivot Football

Club from 1885 to 1923, including the momentous year 1922 when the club changed its name to the Geelong Cats. He was on the executive of the Victorian Football League for most of his life and when died in 1924 the VFL "best and fairest" award was created in his honour.

Geelong Hills - Geelong is flanked on the Western side by rolling hills and countryside and from atop some of these hills the views of the City and Corio Bay are phenomenal. Looking down across the suburbs to the sea is gorgeous, particularly at nightfall as sunshine gives way to the twinkle of lights across the city. The lookout at Ceres is a local favourite.

KILOMETRE: 3.3 - 20.0

Barrabool Road to Cape Otway Road

Ceres is located to the west of Geelong in the Barrabool Hills and is one of the highest points in Geelong. Ceres has a lookout which overlooks the city. The Ceres area was first settled by squatters in the late 1830s. Today, it remains a country atmosphere, including by keeping old gas lights along its main street (lit with electricity). A number of historical homesteads can be found in the township and surrounding hills. Many are constructed from locally hewn Barrabool sandstone.

KILOMETRE: 25.4 - 29.1 Hendy Main Road

Hendy Main Road to Larcombes Road

Here we approach the rural hamlet of Moriac – just under 1,000 people are lucky enough to call this home, enjoying the rural lifestyle yet only 20 minutes from the coast. The Moriac General Store is a very popular stop for local bunch rides.

KILOMETRE: 46.2 - 53.0

Great Ocean Road (B100)

Addiscott Road to Bells Boulevard

And now we approach one of the world's most iconic drives, the Great Ocean Road.

What many people may not know is that the Great Ocean Road was constructed by more than 3,000 returned servicemen from World War I. Construction was done by hand using explosives, pick and shovel, wheelbarrows and some small machinery - a far cry from the high tech road construction we see today. Spanning some 243km, it's a memorial to the lost lives and sacrifices of Australian soldiers.

KILOMETRE: 55.7 -57.9 Great Ocean Road (B100)

As we come down the Great Ocean Road, we approach the township of Torquay, one of Victoria's favourite holiday destinations. Renowned for its spectacular surf beaches and laid-back lifestyle, Torquay is just a 75 minute drive from Melbourne. It has a thriving cycling community, and is a great base for road, mountain or gravel bike riding.

KILOMETRE: 57.9 - 58.9

Bell Street

Esplanade roundabout to GOR roundabout

As you can see, Torquay is about more than just beaches and surf. It has a thriving café and restaurant scene, which you can see as we head along Bell Street. There are plenty of places to kick back and perhaps enjoy a local brew and some people-watching on the sidewalk.

KILOMETRE: 58.9 - 61.2 Sprint Point #1 - The Esplanade

The Esplanade to Horseshoe Bend Roundabout

The first beach along the Esplanade is Fisherman's Beach, or Fishos to the locals. This was the base for a busy little fishing fleet in years gone by, but these days it's better known as a popular spot for families and especially dogs.

Next we have Whites Beach. The light horsemen trained in the sand dunes here during the second World War. Luckily they were here when the fires came through and were able to brush up their skills on fighting bushfires and saving the town.

KILOMETRE: 61.2 - 64.6

Horseshoe Bend Rd

HSB Roundabout to Blackgate Rd Traffic Island

The cylists ride alongside the Surf Coast Walk, the coastal track which connects the towns of Torquay, Anglesea and Aireys Inlet. With breathtaking views, many people choose to hike or ride the entire 44km walk; or if you really want a challenge, you could have a crack at the annual Surf Coast Trail Marathon and run all the way from Torquay to Fairhaven.

KILOMETRE: 74.4 - 81.5

Thirteenth Beach Road to Barwon Heads - Ocean Grove Road

Four of the top 100 golf courses in Australia are on The Bellarine – Barwon Heads Golf Club, the two courses at 13th Beach Golf Club and Curlewis Golf Club.

Hooded Plover - The surf beaches of Point Lonsdale, Ocean Grove, Barwon Heads and Breamlea are the home of the endangered Hooded Plover. You would think a black, white and red bird would stand out on the beach, but these little birds are the masters of disguise! The Hooded Plover or 'Hoodie' spends its whole life on the beach and is one of Australia's most threatened birds. We're working with community volunteers and Birdlife Australia to protect the birds.

Orange-Bellied Parrot is a critically endangered species found in the Geelong region including the Bellarine's coastline. Its habitat is associated with coastal vegetation and also includes south west Tasmania, other parts of Victoria and South Australia. With fewer than 70 birds left in the wild, to find one is like a naturalist's needle in a haystack.

KILOMETRE 81.5 - 94.6

Sprint Point #2 - Barwon Heads-Ocean Grove Road to Portarlington Road

Barwon Heads - Barwon Heads is the home town of the event's namesake, Cadel Evans. Cadel's backyard captures everything that is unique and identifiably Australian.

The town has a dream position with a mix of gentle estuary, rocky coastal headland and ocean beaches. The main street has more than a couple of good places to eat and plenty of boutiques to shop up a storm. It's no wonder Cadel chose it as a home base – and the community adores him as much as he loves the place, decorating the whole town yellow in support and celebration of his 2011 Tour de France heroics. Nearby Thirteenth Beach is a popular surf spot.

Chellenging part on this section

The race hugs the coast at Thirteenth Beach – one of the most picturesque, but exposed sections of the course, where cyclists must navigate and position themselves against the local coastal winds for the first time.

Ocean Grove - Take a break and get some sun in Ocean Grove, a popular surf town surrounded by renowned wineries, pristine beaches and golf courses. Hit the ocean waves, build a sandcastle with the kids, or use the town as a base to explore the countless natural and contemporary attractions across the region.

Beers and Burgers together at last, in an epic location on the main street of Ocean Grove. Blackman's Brewery and Burger Bar is a bright, fun and super friendly coastal Bar to go to with your best crew for fresh beers, brewed less than half an hour away. They are pouring 12 taps of the core and seasonal range, plus a few from The Barrel Farm.

KILOMETRE: 91.3 Ewing Blyth Drive

Adventure Park - is Victoria's biggest water theme park. The park contains many attractions such as numerous waterslides and water playgrounds, the 'Tornado', 'Tsunami' and the recently revealed 'Air Balloons' ride.

Mussels found at the Little Mussel Café. Using traditional hand-smoking processes, Bellarine Smokehouse creates delicate gourmet smoked dishes.

A favourite for locals and travellers alike, Jack Rabbit Vineyard boasts unrivalled views across the bay to Geelong and Melbourne. Wine lovers can choose from an array of award-winning, sophisticated cool climate wines whilst taking in the water views.

Ryrie Street

Old Geelong Gaol

The Geelong Gaol was built in 1854 by the prisoners themselves and was a maximum-security jail for male criminals. Even in Victorian times, it was considered to be a hellish place. Inmates were forbidden to speak about anything except religion, and numerous executions took place. Inmates who died were buried in the grounds, always faced inwards so that even in death they would not know freedom. It closed in 1991 and since then it has been open to the public, and has become a favourite location for ghost hunters.

Ryrie Street to Limeburners Road

Ryrie Street to Limeburners Road

The **Geelong Botanic Gardens** are in Eastern Park. The Gardens were established in Victorian times and[are the fourth oldest in Australia, with a number of heritage listed trees. There is also a kids play space, an on site café and beautiful grounds. Shots from above Eastern Park may see the Geoglyph – a rock sculpture on the bay side designed to be seen from above. It looks like an eagle made from an arrangement of large white stones.

KILOMETRE: 107.3 - 109.8

Limeburners Road to Upper Eastern Beach Road

Limeburners Rd to Hearne Pde to Eastern Beach Road

The art-deco style Eastern Beach is a popular swimming and recreation area and has had some new life added to it with the Heritage listed building now housing the just-opened Beach House Geelong café.

Eastern Beach Road to Yarra Street

Upper Eastern Beach Rd to Yarra Street

The Corio Villa - Proudly sitting in lush gardens above Eastern Beach and taking in the sweeping views of the Geelong waterfront and Corio Bay, Corio Villa is one of our city's most beautiful heritage masterpieces. Corio Villa is considered an important building of international significance and was actually built in Edinburgh, Scotland. Prefabricated and made of cast iron, the house was shipped to Geelong in boxes in 1855 by iron founder Charles D Young and Co. As Australia was growing rapidly due to the gold rush, the importation of houses was popular around this time, but Corio Villa is often recognised as not only the first cast iron property but also a unique building. Soon after Corio Villa was made in Scotland the factory burnt down destroying the moulds to the house. Many people believe that due to the fire, Corio Villa may be the only example of this model prefab building in the world.

KILOMETRE: 115.3 - 116.5

Mt Pleasant Road to Barwon Boulevard

Running, walking and bike riding are also popular activities along the Barwon River as tracks exists to enable such pursuits. Popular spots include Balyang Sanctuary and near Queens Park.

Barwon Grange

Barwon Grange is the only surviving example of the many fashionable river front residences built along the Barwon River during the 1850s and 1860s for the wealthy of Geelong. It is now a National Trust property, and sits at the bottom of Fernleigh Street, on the northern bank of the river. It is readily seen to the left as you drive north across the Princes Highway bridge. The house is notable for its connections with John Samuel Swire, a merchant from Liverpool. After the gold rush, Swire established the The China Navigation Company; this became the foundation for the Swire Group, today a highly diversified global group.

Barwon Blvd to Challambra Crescent

Barwon River - Flowing from the Otway National Park through Geelong to Barwon Heads, the Barwon River is one of Geelong's favourite places to play. As it makes its way through suburban Geelong it's flanked by walking and riding trails, parklands and reserves. On-water, it's popular with water-skiers and rowers alike. It flows through Lake Connewarre, near its mouth at Barwon Heads, which is home to significant bird life and several species of native fish.

Highton and Montpellier - Grazier John Highett set up a farm and finished building his house on a hill overlooking the Barwon River in 1837. Later his property became the Montpellier vineyard, hotel and picnic ground. Highton was named after an abbreviation of his name. Reserves, reservoirs and a school in this beautiful suburb still bear the Montpellier name. The ruins of the original property still exist in Montpellier Park.

KILOMETRE: 117.5 - 120.1 Scenic Road

Scenic Road to Queen's Park Road to Single Lane Bridge

"You've Got Buckleys"

The improbable survival of William Buckley, an escaped convict who lived with the local Wathaurung people for 32 years, is said to be the origin of the phase "you've got buckley's" – meaning "it's as good as impossible". In 1803, William Buckley gave himself a leave pass from the ill-fated settlement at Sorrento, and having walked around Port Phillip Bay, then spent the next 32 years living with the local Wathaurung people. In 1835 he met with members of John Batman's advance party at Indented Head, who were awaiting Batman's return from Launceston with additional supplies for the planned settlement at Melbourne, and Buckley then re-entered European life. There is a labyrinth on the foreshore where the meeting occurred.

Buckley Falls - This pristine and tranquil riverside reserve has stunning waterfall views and environmental and historical significance, that are sure to impress all age groups. The scenic reserve also is home to sensational adventurous walking/bike tracks and is adjacent to the Fyansford Paper Mill site. A must see!

KILOMETRE: 120.1 -122.5

Melville Avenue/Minerva Road

Melville Avenue through to Church Street

The Heights - Parts of the original large National Trust property, The Heights, were sold and donated to The Geelong College, Heights' owner Louis Melville Whyte's alma mater, to build the college's middle school campus. As the property was subdivided and developed, many of the surrounding new streets were given names related to the family, including Melville Avenue, part of the race route.

KILOMETRE: 122.5 -124.3 Church Street

Church Street to Ballarat Road To Glenleith Ave

At Fyansford, internationally renowned street artist Rone - a Geelong native – has returned to transform disused silos into works of art featuring three local identities.

Fyansford Paper Mill

The Fyansford Paper Mill was built in 1878 by a syndicate headed by Captain James Volum at a cost

of £50,000. It had 300 employees and at the time was the largest and most modern paper mill in the southern hemisphere, and the business eventually became Australian Paper Manufacturers Limited. Scrap rags were used to produce paper 188 cm wide, and the factory used water from a sluice to generate its own electricity until 1921. Paper making ceased in 1929, it was an ice works until 1941, then the navy built sea mines there until 1945, when it became derelict for some years.

Provenance Wines

Located in the heritage-listed Fyansford Paper Mill precinct, on the edge of the Barwon River you will find Provenance Wines. An extensive renovation to the 1870s bluestone building, resulting in a modern facility that retains its historic integrity and charm. The new cellar door, awarded Best Value Winery in 2019, offers guests their 5-star rated James Halliday wine and a mouthwatering lunch menu.

Fyansford Cement Silos

In 2017, three large murals of local identities were painted onto the three unused cement silos in

Fyansford by high-profile local artist Tyrone 'Rone' Wright. The images are of three local heroes: Corrina

Eccles, direct descendent of the Wadawurrung people, Col Horsten, who worked at the cement works for 35 years and dual gold Paralympian Kelly Cartwright OAM. The silos - at the southern end of McCurdy Road and clearly visible from the Ring Road - are the remnants of a major cement works that had its quarry and mill below in the valley, with the finished product being transferred up the ridge (via a conveyor belt) to the silos for loading onto the railway spur.

Moorabool Valley - The rich hills of the Moorabool Valley region are one of Australia's premium cool-climate wine regions. There are boutique vineyards here producing some of the well-regarded wine in the country. Family owned and operated wineries with cellar doors offer tastings and some have restaurants within the vines and barrels. There's also a growing food reputation in these hills, with locally grown meats, vegetables, dairy and olive products featured on the menus at some of the quality eateries dotted throughout the region. The Moorabool Valley Taste Trail will guide your appetite around this district. There's also a wonderful farmer's market at Bannockburn on the first Saturday of each month.

KILOMETRE: 124.3 - 124.6 Glenleith Avenue to The Esplanade

(Glenleith Avenue area) in West Geelong is Geelong's centre of cosmopolitan and multiculturalism. The street is jammed packed full of boutique shopping, cafes, fresh produce and some of the city's best pubs, bars and restaurants.

KILOMETRE: 124.6 - 126.3

The Esplanade to Western Beach Road

The Esplanade becomes Western Beach Road to Yarra St

In Greater Geelong there is 133km of coastline, 120 km of streamside frontages, 347 hectares of coastal reserves and 320 hectares of bushland reserve.

Cunningham Pier is a striking landmark located in the heart of Geelong's vibrant Waterfront. It was built in the 1850's and was a vital part of Geelong's port up until the late 1970's when rail was used to load and unload cargo.

These days Cunningham Pier houses a restaurant, a boutique bar and an event space offering panoramic sweeping bay views.

Ex-industrial buildings and 19th century wool stores along the Geelong Waterfront are now home to

restaurants, shopping centres, museums and the Waterfront campus of Deakin University.

Several new sculptures have been installed throughout Central Geelong as part of the City Entrances and Waterfront Linkages project.

Moorabool Street

The National Wool Museum (Moorabool and Brougham Streets) tells the story of the Geelong region and its initial growth as a wool centre.

Starting in the heart of the Waterfront at the 'North' sculpture, Moorabool Street runs through the city centre and up the hill and then down to the Barwon River. Moorabool Street is the main drag.

Christ Church is the oldest Anglican Church in Victoria in continuous use on its original site, and the parish predates the Diocese of Melbourne. From 1841 a group of laymen led by Henry Tyssen and later Sir Charles Sladen, first Treasurer of the Victorian Colony, strove to found a church in the Geelong region. It stands on the hill at the top of Moorabool Street.


